

Behind-the-Scenes of LeSean Thomas's Yasuke Online (YouTube)



By the Shore of Lake Michigan Recovering WWII Prison Camp & Resettlement Stories through Poetry April 7, 7pm

Japan Society (New York, NY)

As part of the commemoration of the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II, Japan Society is hosting a book talk and signing featuring the newly translated tanka poetry book *By the Shore of Lake Michigan*. Editor Nancy Matsumoto, translators Mariko Aratani and Kyoko Miyabe, and Eri F. Yasuhara will be the speakers for this event.

The book, 15 years in the making, features a collection of World War II-era *tanka* poetry written by first-generation Japanese-American couple and Nancy's grandparents **Tomiko** and **Ryokuyō Matsumoto**, who were incarcerated in one of the ten prison camps.
