JFF Theater Spotlight: The Genealogy of Sake Available until July 31 (10pm EDT)

For this edition's spotlight, we're highlighting *The Genealogy of Sake*, a documentary currently available on JFF Theater.

This documentary is a blend of sake history and instruction, following the lives of several Toji – sake artisans – based in Noto, where an earthquake caused severe damage in 2024. A story about the importance, influence, and effort of the Toji as it is about the struggle to pass down the legacy and skills to the next generation, this film also highlights the disciples of these Toji, including one who has become the first female Toji of the area.

Viewers can learn not only the origin and process of sake but what it takes for these artisans to devote their lives for sake-making.

Accepting Applications until July 7, 5PM (EDT)



20th Anniversary of Student Haiku Contest

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Yuji Agematsu: 2023–2024Ongoing until August 30
Judd Foundation (New York, NY)

Now open! Judd Foundation presents an exhibition of work by **Yuji Agematsu**. Visitors will see three hundred and sixty-six of zips, tiny devotional sculptures Agematsu fashions from detritus he finds in the New York streets and then gardens inside the cellophane sleeve of a cigarette pack. These zips memorialize his daily walks taken in a year of 2024, one for each day.

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Reflections of a Changing Japan: The Evolution of Shin Hanga Ongoing until June 29 Worcester Art Museum (Worcester, MA)

Visitors can explore 40 works in this exhibition dedicated to Shin Hanga, a printmaking movement that emerged in early 1900s Japan. Reviving traditional Edo-period techniques while incorporating modern artistic methods and themes, Shin Hanga produced works that are both distinctly Japanese and globally resonant. Many of the pieces on view are being publicly displayed for the first time.
