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**Time Exposed: Hiroshi Sugimoto's Seascapes** 

Ongoing until Feb. 8, 2026 The Parrish Art Museum (Water Mill, NY)

Now on view! This exhibit features the decade-long project of the well-known photographer, **Hiroshi Sugimoto**. Ranging from 1980 to 1991, the Time Exposed portfolio documents crisp, clean skies to misty, overcast scenes of the Adriatic Sea, Atlantic Ocean, Ionian Sea, Pacific Ocean, and Tasman Sea among others. Highlighting Sugimoto's technical skill of using a 19th-century black-and-white film camera, the monochromatic scenes depict a quiet stillness that are heightened by the uninterrupted natural landscape.

This year's theme is Japan as a "country on the frontlines" or "harbinger state" and as a comparative or alternate lens/platform.

Applicants based in North America who have completed their degree within the last ten years and conduct active research (in academia or another sector) or reporting (on staff or freelance) in their careers are encouraged to apply.

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# JFF Theater Spotlight



Now Playing: Mottainai Kitchen Available until Oct. 30 (10pm EDT)

This edition's JFF Theater Spotlight is on *Mottainai Kitchen (2020)*, currently available for free on JFF Theater.

"Try to pause and question what's really edible or not."

Did you know?: 1/3 of the food produced worldwide is discarded. In Japan alone, 6.43 million tons of food are discarded yearly. That amounts to 139 grams per person, the equivalent of one rice ball.

In this thought-provoking documentary, Austrian food activist **David Gross** and his group of friends travel across Japan to learn about the philosophy and concept of "mottainai." While exploring ways to reduce food waste, he meets several people devoted to the cause, including a monk who cooks *shojin ryori* (zero-waste Japanese cuisine) and a vegetable specialist who encourages people to incorporate wild plants in their diets.

A highlight of the documentary is Gross' visit to a Tokyo *conbini* (convenience store) utilizing an in-store kitchen that reduces food waste. During this visit, he cooks a delicious meal with almost expired and expired food, salvaged from the store!
